

We had our first 2024 Mid-Atlantic Bight (MAB) recapture this past month and several other reports came in that indicated mahi are once again present in the offshore canyons and nearshore MAB areas. In past years, the peak of the MAB season for mahi has been mid-September but we have had several tag reports come in through to the end of October. By month, September historically has the highest tagging activity (n=193), followed by August (162), October (112), July (107), and then June (20). Last year, we had 98 fish tagged in the MAB which was the highest annual amount across our 23-year history. In five days, the White Marlin Open begins which really ushers in the offshore season in the MAB and in previous years large mahi have been caught in conjunction with this tournament, but the last year any mahi greater than 70+ pounds was caught was 2020. In 2019, two other 70+ lb fish were caught in the MAB in August but we have not detected any others of this size class since. Hopefully, this changes in 2024.

158-Day Mahi Movement Documented off Panama




Figure 1 The most probable track for a 40" female tagged and released aboard Miss Costa Rica on November 19th, 2023. Daily positions are labeled by month. The tag surfaced on April 24th, 2024, in the Costa Rican EEZ. The total path is 5,268.77 miles.




Figure 2 Eight most probable tracks for adult male and female dolphinfish tracked off TSL from our 2022 and 2023 tag deployments.

In May, we first announced that a satellite tag deployed on a 40" female dolphinfish had surfaced and started to transmit after remaining with the fish for 158-days, the second longest satellite tag monitoring period for our tagging program. This month, we showcase the most probable track for this 40" cow, an estimated movement of 5,628 miles among four countries (Panama, Colombia, Ecuador, and Costa Rica) as well as two high seas areas in the Eastern Tropical Pacific Ocean (ETP). The fish was released off Tropic Star Lodge on November 19th, 2023; it first moved north, and then south to enter the Colombian EEZ after 15 days. From there, the fish moved between the southwestern portion of the Colombian EEZ, the northern portion of the Ecuadorian EEZ, and a high seas area for 67 days. The cow then moved west and then south through the Galapagos Islands, and then swam back north into the Costa Rican EEZ, the jurisdiction where the fish resided the longest (46 days or 29% of the track). While this is our first 100+ day geolocation movement in the ETP, the first 50 days of the track is consistent with eight other geolocation tracks that shown the overall pattern for fish




Figure 3 30 satellite tag point-to-point movements acquired in the fall off Panama. The three panes provide different spatial scales to allow for the extent of the short- and longer-term movements to be viewed. In the bottom panes, all geolocation tracks are included as grey lines. The numbers indicate days at liberty.

The distance between the tag and recovery sites for **Wam-Jam's** and **Killin' Time II's** fish was 762.44, and 817.31 miles, respectively; the movement rates, based on 28, and 35 days at liberty, was 27.23, and 23.35 miles per day. The distance between tag and recovery site for **Lightning Strike's** fish was 648.66 miles and the movement rate, based on 39 days at liberty, was 16.63 miles per day.


