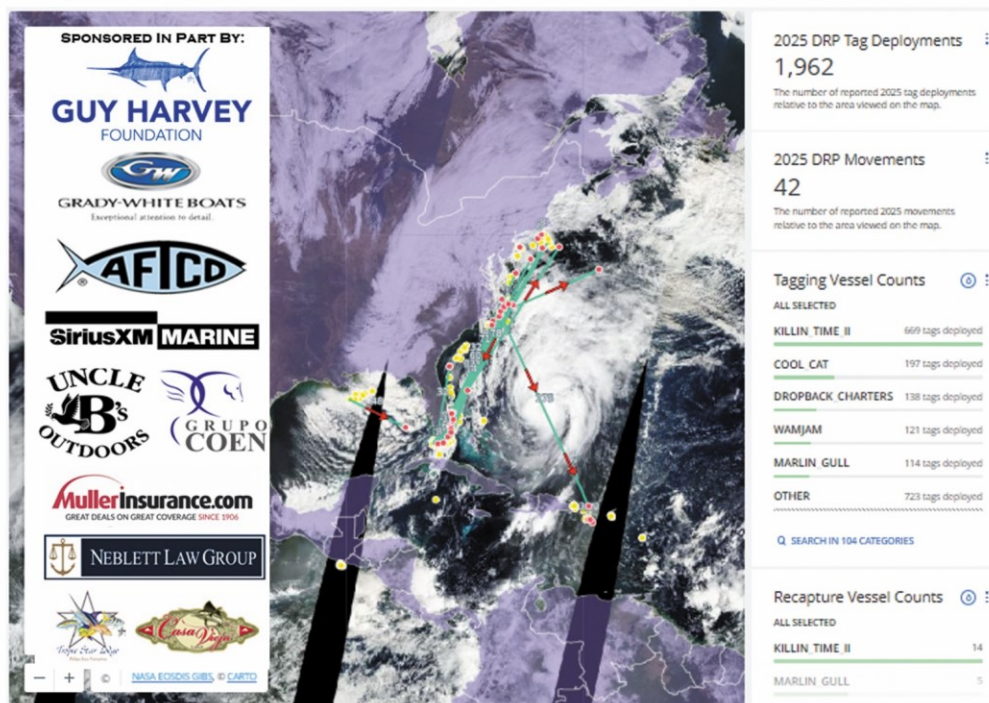

Over the past month, the Mid-Atlantic Bight dolphin season has ended. The early October Noreaster was the catalyst to usher in cooler SSTs throughout the region and anglers have reported that as of two weeks ago fish have moved on (likely toward the east or southeast Gulf Stream and Sargasso Sea waters). Elsewhere, reports off the north coast of Puerto Rico have been consistent with good catches of mahi reported from off San Juan through to Arecibo. Our mid-October trip was a success and we are due to fish the same waters next week. Hurricane Melissa sat south of Jamaica for several days which led to low fishing reports off DR due to the fact that the DR Navy was not permitting anglers to fish. Nonetheless, reports from southern DR in the first two weeks of October were still really hot, with 1200 pounds landed in one outing by a single boat. This is the highest single day amount we have documented in 2.5 years of data collection for a single boat. What we have observed with our data collection south of DR is that their dolphin season south of the island runs from March to the end of October. Contrast this with the historical run of dolphinfish south of PR from January through May. The vast FAD network deployed south of DR likely hold fish through the summer months and into the fall. West of DR off of Grand Cayman, Dr. Guy Harvey tagged and released a small fish in October but he said that is the first dolphin he has encountered off the Caymans in a good amount of time.

October Puerto Rico Research Expedition



Earlier this month, **Dolphinfish Research Program (DRP)** personnel embarked on a tagging expedition to Puerto Rico to enhance data collection on dolphin. In two 8-hour outings, fishing off San Juan, **Captain Daryl Wiley** and our team tagged and released 17 dolphinfish and a blue marlin aboard [Caribbean Fishing Academy](#), a fishing charter based in San Juan. These outings contribute to our and grant work with the **Caribbean Fishery Management Council (CFMC)**, which began in September 2024. During these recent outings, we were able to deploy three satellite tags. On the first outing, we deployed a satellite tag on a 34" female dolphinfish, and on day two, we deployed tags on a 48" male and a 125-pound blue marlin caught at the same location. We opportunistically deployed the tag on the blue marlin to investigate dolphin-marlin predator-prey relationships, given that both the bull and the blue were caught and released at the same location. As for the deployments on the dolphinfish, they

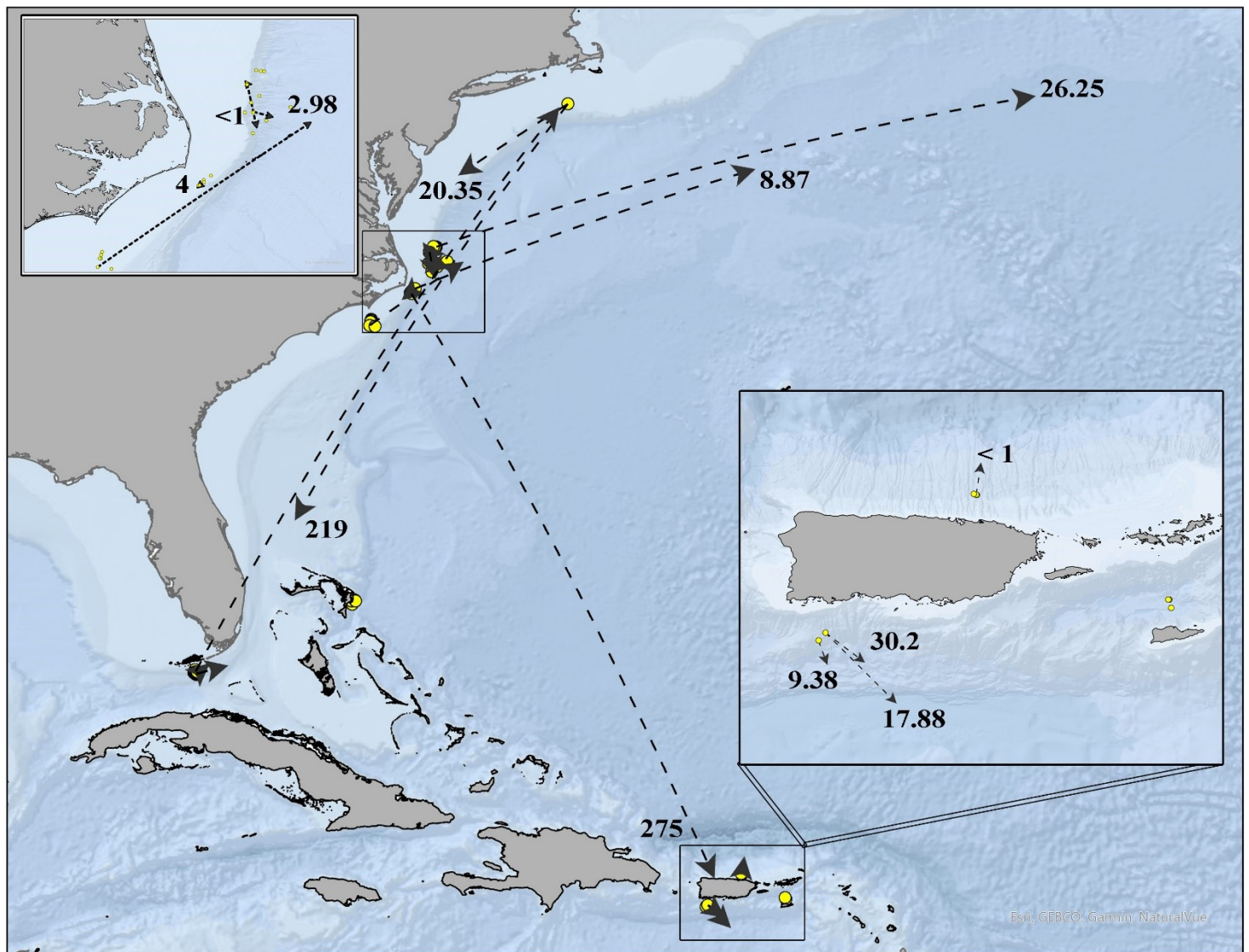
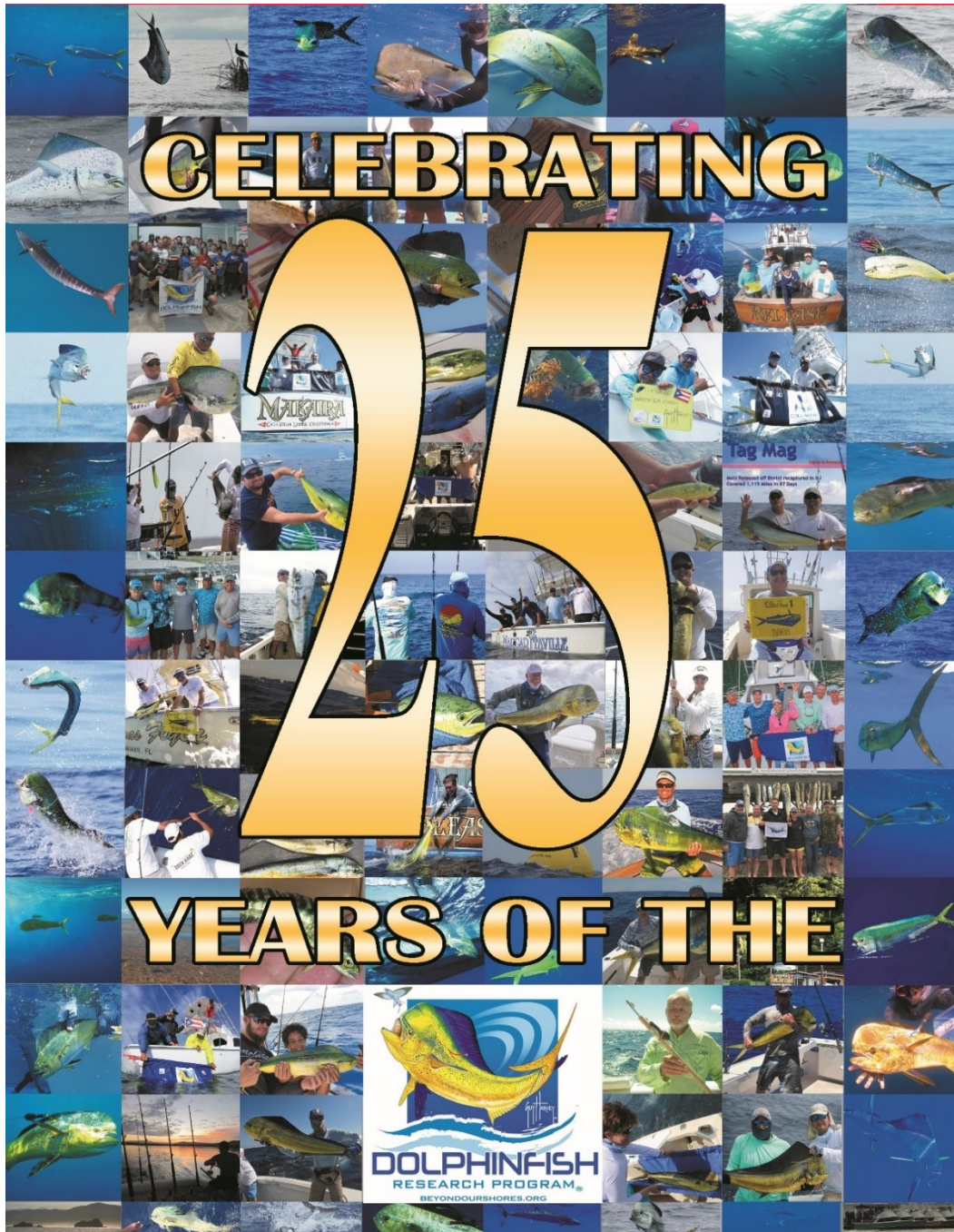


Figure 1 Conventional and satellite tagging results through 15 outings over the last 13 months with our work with the CFMC.

mark the 12th and 13th of 30th toward our work with the **CFMC**. Our objective with our work with the CFMC is to focus conventional and satellite tag deployments in three key tagging zones: the Mid-Atlantic Bight, Puerto Rico, and the United States Virgin Islands. Thus far, through 15 outings over the past year, we have tagged and released 295 dolphinfish, deployed 13 satellite tags, and generated 17 movements between the aforementioned zones (image above). This progress contributes to our overall work to better understand the impacts of changing environments and fishing pressure on dolphinfish in the U.S. Caribbean Sea and beyond. Tagging Progress to Date



Reported releases from January 1, 2025, to October, 29, 2025, continue to have our program headed for a strong year of data collection throughout the Western Central Atlantic and Eastern Tropical Pacific Oceans (6th highest to date). In total, 104 named vessels have tagged and released dolphinfish in 2025. From these tag deployments, 42 new movements have been generated. These movements can be viewed at dolphintagging.com/map.

Support our 25th Year of Tagging Activity!



Next year marks the 25th anniversary of the Dolphin Research Program (DRP). The last eight of those 25 years have been under the management of the [Beyond Our Shores](#)

[Foundation](#), a 501(c)(3) founded to manage and expand the DRP as well as focus on other key fisheries research topics throughout the Western Central Atlantic (WCA) and Eastern Tropical Pacific Oceans (ETP). Over the last eight years, we have received support from 410 donors, in which many of

whom are recurring annual supporters. It is only through the support of these individuals, as well as our corporate sponsors and program participants, that the DRP continues to compile new movement records and data on dolphinfish in the WCA and ETP. As of today, 39,601 dolphinfish have been tagged for the DRP, and 904 recaptures have been recorded. In addition, 134 satellite tags have been deployed on dolphinfish and 12 on wahoo. Collectively, these data have been used to publish [17 scientific articles](#), and the data is publicly available at dolphintagging.com/map. With two key scientific papers in preparation on detailed regional movement dynamics and catch and effort, as well as our ambitious distribution goals for 2026 (400 kits and 5,000 tags), we need your support to achieve these key outcomes. In 2025, we have distributed 253 tagging kits, or 3,043 tags, and we estimate by year's end we will distribute at least 50 more kits or 500 more tags.
